“We Need Your Help” says Lay Dir. Pat Carr

Dear Sisters and Brothers in Christ,

Cursillo has been an enduring force in the Archdiocese of Newark for over 45 years now. Not only are we seeing second generation Cursillistas, there are also third generation Candidates making our Weekends. Arriving where we are today didn't happen all by itself. A lot of blood, sweat and tears (and yes, palanca) went into the making and shaping of this movement at the local level. We are preceded by countless hard-working Cursillistas who tirelessly toiled, giving our local movement the heart and soul that we have come to know and love.

Year in and year out Cursillistas have stepped up to the plate and offered their time, talents and treasure to ensure that the gospel word is spread, to bring others to know the wonder and joy of living a Christ-centered life and to be the living face of Jesus in all of their environments. Most simply put, our movement thrives due to the willingness and selflessness of so many Cursillistas to help each other grow in their faith by sharing the love they have for God by loving one another.

One thing we face as we journey together, though, is the unavoidable financial expense necessary to keep us going. Our Treasurer Bill Dougherty touched on this

fact with his story in this issue of Rainbow Connections. I'm not, and never was, a professional fundraiser. So I'll try to get right to the point. After paying some pretty hefty expenses recently, most notably putting required deposits down with the Youth Center for future Weekends booked through 2010, we find ourselves down to a minimal pool of funds left in the checking account.

As the head of your leadership within the movement, I'll share with you that I wish there were a secret benefactor to pay our bills or a money tree or a trust fund, but there's not. We receive no funding from the Archdiocese of Newark. We rely solely on the generosity of Cursillistas like you to pay for the expense of putting on the many events we sponsor all year, every year. We have no choice but to try our hardest to keep our expenses to an absolute minimum. In reality, though, mounting four Weekends a year is an expensive proposition. While the per-person rate charged for each Weekend participant just barely covers the actual per-person expense, if one, two or three candidates do not have the funds to pay for the Weekend, that translates into a \$200 to \$600 expense against our reserves. That times four Weekends a year translates to, for instance, up to a \$2,400 hit. So you can see how it can add up. While we would love to maintain our long-standing policy of not turning any can-

didate away for lack of funds, from a financial standpoint, this policy is no longer feasible. Perhaps Group Reunions can figure out a way to finance a candidate short of funds or Sponsors may need to pay their candidate's way, but at this point the cash reserves in our treasury are not able to bear that financial burden.

There are numerous expenses we incur throughout the course of the year. The money has to come from somewhere.

So, I come to you with hat in hand. We are facing this shortfall head-on. There are two ways you can help - one is even fun! The first way is to RSVP to our "Reunion of the Weekends" Social / Fundraiser taking place on Friday evening, October 2 at St. Anastasia, Teaneck. We'll make a little money on the \$35 per person tickets sold. And you're guaranteed to have a great time! Hopefully you can re-connect with some of the friends you made when you were a candidate. The other requires perhaps a little more pain and a little more effort. It involves getting out your check book, writing a check and mailing it or giving it to our Treasurer. How much? I'll leave that up to you. We accept donations large and small! If you could donate \$100 that would be wonderful, \$200 - even better. But if \$20 is what works for you right now, we'll gladly accept that too. Who

should the check be made out to? Quite simply, "Cursillo" will do just fine.

Cursillo is a unique movement. Not many movements can claim that they literally and in some ways tangibly change lives for the better. Cursillo offers us friends, love, grace, a positive

lifestyle, spiritual fulfillment, connectedness and a pathway to salvation. We are entrusted with a legacy left to us from the early Newark Cursillista pioneers from all those many years ago. Let's all do our part and give back a little to keep this great movement we're part of alive and fresh and invigorated for those who follow in our footsteps.

School of Leaders – The Cornerstone of Cursillo

Procrastination is a serious fault of mine. "Never put off to tomorrow what can be done today" has never been my mantra. Today is September 3rd, this article was to be submitted September 2nd and here I sit paying the price of procrastination, red-faced publicly confessing, struggling to complete this before the day's end. But God in His infinite mercy has once again rescued me, for today is the feast day of St. Gregory the Great, last papal leader of the 6th century, Doctor of the Church and my thoughts today focus on such leaders, their qualities and their presence among us.

St. Gregory was born in the year 540 into wealth. He was first a lawyer, becoming Chief Magistrate of Rome, and then after a year of prayer and inward struggle he resigned to follow a monastic life. Years later he was ordained a deacon and served as papal ambassador to Constantinople for six years. Finally, called back to Rome, he was allowed to return to his beloved monastery as abbot. In 590 Gregory was elected Pope, a position he accepted with much reluctance

for in his heart he was a monastic. While his reign as pope impacted greatly on the disciples and doctrine of the medieval Church, he was known as "the Great" for his charity to the poor, working endlessly to meet both their temporal and spiritual needs. Today Gregory the Great is considered patron saint of musicians, singers, students and teachers, which in a very roundabout way leads us to the focus of this article, patron saint → teacher/student → School of Leaders → get it? Sorry about that, but I just couldn't resist.

According to Article IV in the Archdiocese of Newark Cursillo Movement Pastoral Plan By Laws and Guidelines adopted June 2006, School of Leaders is "the cornerstone of the Cursillo movement, the complement and extension of the Secretariat". The purpose of the school is to supply the Secretariat with teams of leaders who are prepared, technically and spiritually, to strengthen the spirit of the authentic Cursillo Movement, for the evangelization of the modern world. In keeping with this goal, this fall's sessions will concentrate on the qualities of Christ-centered leaders. I have asked

our speakers to format their talks as they would a Rollo, expanding on the characteristics and qualities of the people in their lives who have sustained them on their journey. We are truly blessed by our Cursillo family; thank you Matt Glowski, Yvonne and Donovan Green and Dawn Torpey for your immediate yes to the call to speak. Our fall sessions will vary in day and location hopefully making them more convenient for attendance. Please do not procrastinate, mark your calendars at once!

School of Leaders is for all Cursillistas – those who wish to serve on team, those who are about to serve on team and those of us who have served repeatedly. Some come to learn, some come to share, some come to support; we all come to grow as a family in the light of Christ's love. The Role of the Secretariat

The Cursillo movement in the Newark Archdiocese is comprised of many members - probably upwards of 2,000. Some are active, others not. As Catholics who experienced a Cursillo Weekend, all were touched by the Holy Spirit when they were presented with their Cursillo Cross with these marching orders: "Christ is counting on you."

Although Cursillo is a movement, and not an organization, as a large and active group, certain leadership roles are required. Each local Cursillo is lead by its Secretariat. The word "Secretariat" can sound somewhat authoritative and therefore daunting. In reality, though, the Secretariat is neither heavy-handed nor imposing. It's a collection of hard-working volunteer Cursillista leaders that meet on a regular basis to set policy, plan and execute events, discuss and recommend Weekend procedures and review what's working and what's not; fix what's broken and look for ways to enhance what's serving the movement well. At its most basic, the Secretariat can be thought of as the Cursillo Steering Committee.

The Secretariat is headed up by the Lay Director and the Assistant Lay Director. The Assistant Lay Director serves a two-year term and typically directs the School of Leaders prior to

taking the helm in the Lay Director role, where they serve for another two years. The Secretariat includes a Spiritual Advisor, a priest dedicated to

serving Cursillo. Other members of the Secretariat, about eight in all, serve various functions, including the Treasurer, Secretary, Pre-Cursillo, Weekend and Post-Cursillo Committee Chairpersons and their Committee members.

Our Secretariat meets five or six times annually, typically on a Tuesday night at the Casa. As with all Cursillo events, the meeting starts with prayer. A leadership-focused Group Reunion ensues. The Lay Director sets the agenda for the business portion of the meeting and various topics are covered. Committee Chairpersons give reports on their projects. Administrative details are discussed. Details of planned events are hammered out. The Treasurer's report on where we

stand financially is presented. New business is covered.

In our local movement we pride ourselves on giving the optimal

number of Cursillistas the grace-filled opportunity to lead a Weekend as a rector. Unlike other local Cursillo movements, Newark's movement always has new leadership at the helm every single Cursillo Weekend. The rector role is a one-shot deal. The staffing of the Angel and Warden roles is discussed at Secretariat meetings as these individuals will go on to serve the following year as rectors.

We are truly blessed to have an extremely dedicated and cohesive Secretariat serving our movement. Please keep this leadership group in your prayers, that their efforts to help others form a more meaningful, more personal and closer relationship to Christ may always be guided by the Holy Spirit.

The Role of the Weekend Committee Explained

What is the purpose of the Weekend Committee? Someone who has not made a Cursillo might assume that this committee would run the Weekends, while those who have made the Weekend know that this is not the case. Upon accepting the invitation to lead a Weekend, it's up to the Rector to recruit a Team, Spiritual Directors and a Music Minister. The Rector then begins the process of Team formation by holding up to eight meetings over the next five or six months, in essence preparing for the Weekend and forming the Team into a living Christian community. The Team members write their rollos and along with the entire Cursillo community, pray for and recruit Candidates to make the Cursillo. Once the Weekend starts, the Angel / Warden are responsible for keeping everything running on time.

This being said, then why do we need a Weekend Committee? While no two Cursillo Weekends are the same due to the personalities involved (different Rectors / Team), there is a link from Weekend to Weekend, due to the guidelines that are in place. I know when I made my Weekend and then served on a Team I was very much in awe of the Rectors leading the Cursillo. Many Rectors have told us how overwhelmed they felt about the task at hand. Anxiety quickly subsided once they are presented with Rectors Guidelines. This is a manual which has been developed throughout the years by many dedicated people from our Cursillo community. Many areas are covered: from choosing a Team, to what to discuss at each Team meeting, what to say in your opening remarks to Candidates on Thursday, how to run Chapel Visits, Rules of the Casa, to conducting the Closing, and much more.

The Weekend Committee meets with the newly appointed Rectors, Angels/Wardens, Support Rectors and Service Teams to present in a seminar format, highlighting the main guidelines, prior to the Rectors being charged with choosing

their Teams. We encourage diversification of age, location and occupation as part of the Team selection process. The committee's goal is that by the end of the seminar all present get a clearer picture of what their responsibilities are prior to, during and after the weekend. We also provide to the Rectors updated lists of people who have been recommended to be on Team. After every Cursillo weekend, the Weekend committee

Please Offer Palanca for Cursillo World-Wide

Remember when you were a candidate on Cursillo and just before you received your palanca notes one of the Spiritual Directors explained the concept of palanca? It was at that point that you became aware of the breadth and scope of the Cursillo movement on a world-wide level. More than likely, notes were shared from fellow Cursillistas from far-away places. People you didn't know were praying and offering sacrifices for your success - it was pretty mind-boggling!

Those letters were written by real people who cared enough about you - someone they didn't even know - in the hope for you to have a grace- and Spirit-filled experience. Our local movement for many years has had a volunteer Palanca Coordinator that has spear-headed getting palanca in the hands of the right Weekend people and also sending out palanca on behalf of the Archdiocese of Newark to Weekends happening far and near. Jim Clough and Pat Ferrara performed admirably in the role of Palanca Coordinator in the past and now John

Tronolone heads up this ministry in our local movement. Our movement offers many thanks to these hard-working volunteers.

It's time that the Newark Cursillo became a little more pro-active in doing palanca on a more macro level. With that in mind, we are initiating a formal program whereby our Cursillistas will be asked to pray for Cursillo Weekends taking place not only locally, but around the world. That way, when John responds to requests for palanca from an array of locations, he can respond truthfully by explaining our movement is truly offering palanca for their success.

Here's how this program will work. We are designating First Fridays, that is the first Friday of each new month throughout the year, as the local Newark Cursillo's day for each of us to offer some sort of palanca for the success of Weekends world-wide. Your palanca could be attending Mass and receiving the Eucharist, praying the Rosary, or a decade of the Rosary, spontaneous prayers or offer-

ing some sort of sacrifice specifically so that others will be successful in their Cursillo endeavors.

And so you don't forget, three days prior to the First Friday, you will receive an email reminder and a list of all of the specific Weekends and their locations that will be happening in the coming month to offer your palanca for. John Tronolone has generously volunteered to keep the list updated and Joanne Rinkus, Secretary of our local movement, has generously volunteered to put the reminder together and send it out with the list. This is an "honor" system, nobody will be keeping track of who may be participating, or the palanca they may be doing. But we do ask that you participate.

Our kick-off for this "prayer chain" program will be next month, for October. Prayer and the Eucharist are at the heart of Cursillo success. Watch your in-box for your monthly palanca request for upcoming weekends - one of them will be a Women's Weekend in October sponsored by the Archdiocese of Newark!

Thoughts on Sponsorship in Cursillo

I would like to share with you some information so that you might have a better understanding of what is involved in being a sponsor.

The purpose of sponsoring is to bring change into the environments. By helping each candidate to fulfill their baptismal responsibility to go forth as apostles and proclaim the Gospel. So sponsorship should not be taken lightly. It should be a thoughtful act to bring Christ into the world. The Cursillo Weekend will also change the candidate's life forever. Therefore, you should know your candidate very well. You truly need to "Make a friend, be a friend and then bring that friend to Christ and Cursillo." Obviously, a sponsor should speak to God about the candidate before speaking to the candidate about God and the Cursillo Weekend.

As a sponsor you should know that

candidates usually fall into three categories: Those who should go to Cursillo. They are the people who are natural leaders in the church and community. Those who can go to Cursillo. They are the ordinary Catholics, who are trying to live the catholic life as best they know how. Those who cannot or should not go to Cursillo. Those who have emotional problems and those who have drinking, drug or moral problems. As well as anyone who is not Catholic.

That being said, a sponsor should explain to his/her candidate the format of the Cursillo Weekend in detail. This should include a description of the Rollos of each day as well as the discussions and posters that will be associated with each of the Rollos. The sponsor should also be sure to discuss the Cursillo Fourth Day with his/ her candidate so that he/she will know what is expected

of a Cursillistas after the weekend. If possible a sponsor should invite his/her candidate to attend several of his/her Group Reunions as well as an Ultreya before living the Cursillo Weekend. This will give him/her a glimpse of what the Fourth Day is about. As a sponsor it is your responsibility to journey with the new Cursillistas for at least four months and to get him /her into a Group Reunion and to Ultreyas.

Obviously, it is the sponsor's responsibility, once the candidate agrees to attend to the Cursillo Weekend, to get a completed application (all three parts) to the person responsible for processing applications. It is also his/her responsibility get the candidate to the weekend on time on Thursday evening home again on Sunday evening after the Closing Ceremony.

As you can see sponsorship is a great

responsibility which should not be taken lightly. So take the time necessary to pray and ask for the guidance of the Holy Spirit in discerning who you might ask to live a Cursillo Weekend. Then take the time necessary to properly prepare the candidate for the weekend and the Fourth Day. Truly "Make a Friend Be a Friend then Bring That Friend To Christ and Cursillo.

Remember if you do not fulfill the responsibilities of a sponsor, those responsibilities will then be placed upon your community.

I would strongly recommend that each sponsor or his or her Cursillo community should purchase these two Booklets from the Cursillo National Office. For the sponsor the "Sponsor's Booklet" and for the Candidate "Cursillo What Is

It?" These two booklets will give you more information than I am able to give in this brief article.

This gathering will take place at St. Anastasia in Teaneck on Friday October 2nd, 2009 with dinner, dancing and some great fellowship with other Cursillistas. There will be more information on this event coming shortly. I hope to see all of you there! If you cannot attend and would like to make a dona-
